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Happy New Year and welcome back! I hope each of you had some time to relax and recharge during the holiday break! We are excited to launch this newsletter to enhance communication with students.

As we begin 2021, I hope you are filled with a renewed sense of energy and excitement about moving forward especially after a year like no other with a global pandemic, protests across the country against racism and social injustices and a historic presidential elec-The recent insurrection tion. attempt at the U.S. Capitol in January was even more disturbing to witness. I and the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Taskforce issued the following statement on behalf of NCSSS faculty, staff and students. "We at National Catholic School of Social Service (NCSSS) of The Catholic University of America stand in solidarity with President John Garvey's letter condemning the violent insurrection that occurred on January 6, 2021. We stand with and pray for

the family members of those who lost their lives and were injured."

During times like these, we must uphold our social work code of ethics, which charges us to be attentive to social injustices and value the dignity and worth of all people. The de-escalation methods in response to the violent rioters were strikingly different from the startling and often violent use of force by authorities on Black Lives Matter protesters marching for racial justice during the summer months. As social workers and educators, we must call out these injustices and mobilize ourselves and our communities for change.

As we begin to honor and celebrate Black History Month, we must all consider our next steps. We all have a role to play to move our country forward. To this end, NCSSS will host a "Call to Action" meeting for all staff, faculty, and students this semester to identify clear strategies that NCSSS can undertake. Together, we will develop a plan for mobilizing our NCSSS community to action. The DEI Taskforce will be following up with an invitation to this meeting on March 5 with further details but we are excited to have <u>Dr. Charles</u> <u>E. Lewis, Jr.</u> from the Congressional Research Institute for Social Work and Policy (CRISP) to lead us in this endeavor.

Now more than ever, we need compassionate and skilled social work professionals committed to leading change! All of us at NCSSS are honored to be part of your educational journey and look forward to our collaborative work together to end racial and social injustices.

In the Field

Each month we explore field from the perspective of a current student

Tanazia Matthews is a foundation year MSW student currently in field with the COM-PASS Program at Catholic Charities DC. Tanazia explains, "The COMPASS works with DC residents by providing assistance with creating a plan for achieving their goals." Tanazia's day usually starts with skills practice with her fellow interns, followed by participation in communications meetings allowing her to provide ideas on how the program can be improved for its clients. Tanazia also spends time conducting client surveys, which assistant in informing the program's improvements. Tanazia explains, "I have learned a lot in my placement from skills practice to being in the community...For someone following in my footsteps, I would tell them this is your time to shine. This is not a competition, go at your own pace, take breaks and remember self-care is important...also get all that they can out of field placement and their courses because both are equally important in this field."
