### **Celebrating Women in Social Work**

This March, we celebrate and honor the trailblazing women who contributed to the field of social work as well as those currently in the field paving new ways to social justice and equity. Women have played an integral role in developing the social work profession throughout history. Pioneers including Ida B. Wells and Jane Addams's efforts

in community building and racial justice paved the way for their successors Dorothy Height, Frances Perkins and Mary Church Terrell.

The National Council of Catholic Women was founded in 1920 with the intention of organizing around the new found civic duties in result of the Suffrage Movement of 1920. One of the

first initiatives of the NCCW was a program to aid Catholic immigrants with their relocation in the United States. A few years later, the NCCW created and funded the National Catholic School of Social Service, which became affiliated with CUA in 1923. As a result of this landmark decision, some of the very first students at CUA were women social work students!

## In the Field

Each month we explore field from the perspective of a current student

Q Garcia is a Senior in the BSW program and in field at the Supporting and Mentoring Youth Advocates and Leaders (SMYAL) housing program. Q and their team provide housing resources and support to LGBTQ+ youth experiencing homelessness in the DC area "Everyday looks different...my main priority is checking in with my clients to make

sure they are being connected to services and making progress on their goals. I also run a weekly staff support group," Q says. They also are involved in housing advocacy work at the macro level, working towards more affirming policies for their clients. Q's supervisor has also become a integral part of their experience at SMYAL, acting as a positive mentor. As Q moves on this year to

an advanced-standing program at Smith College, they reflect on their experiences in field. When asked what advice they have for others in field, Q takes a proactive approach. "Advocate for yourself. Set up meetings to learn more, ask for what you need and become involved in all aspects of the agency to make the most of your field placement."
